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**Report Category:** FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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#### **Report Highlights:**

The competent Mexican authorities which regulate food and agricultural imports and/or require official U.S. export certificates include the Secretariat of Agriculture (SADER), Secretariat of Health (SALUD), Ministry of Environment and Natural Resources (SEMARNAT), and the Secretariat of the Treasury and Public Credit (HACIENDA). Appendix 1 includes the Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) Processed Egg and Egg Products Export Certificate (LPS-234) and Processed Egg and Egg Products Export Certificate (LPS-234) in effect since January 1, 2022.

#### **Executive Summary:**

The following report provides U.S. exporters and stakeholders updated information on required export certificates for U.S. agricultural-product exports, as per Mexico's import standards and regulations. In 2022, at the time of this report, there are no significant changes to announce regarding Mexican import laws. Nonetheless, due to recurring trade issues related to the documents which accompany U.S. agricultural consignments to Mexico, this report includes additional information: **Section I:** Illustrates examples of certificates under AMS' Further Processed Egg Products Verification Program (PEEPEV). **Section II**: Includes information exporters must complete to enable their certificates of origin to qualify for preferential treatment under the United States-Mexico-Canada Agreement (USMCA). Exporters must meet nine data elements in accordance with prescribed formats. Also, it provides information to correctly amend or reissue APHIS's export certificates for dairy products for human consumption. **Section IV:** Emphasizes the importance of verifying the inspecting official's signature on export certificates and corresponding letterheads from the issuing agency: Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS), Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), and Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS). Mexico's National Service of Health, Food Safety, and Food Quality (SENASICA) border officials notify SENASICA headquarters when shipments accompanied with USDA certificates containing differing signatures arrive for inspection. Shipments are retained at the border port of entry (POE) until the issue is clarified between USDA and SENASICA and depending on the outcome shipments may face rejection. Additionally, U.S. exporters are encouraged to periodically access FAS database and review FAS Mexico GAIN reports for possible changes in regulations and standards throughout the year.

#### **Section II. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)**

The USMCA includes a specific USMCA Certificate of Origin, which eliminates the need for Customs and Border Protection (CBP) Form 434. This allows U.S. exporter, importer, or producer conducting business with Mexico and Canada to generate the certificate in any format that meets nine data elements: 1-5: Information about the certifier, exporter, producer, and importer of the good; 6: Description and Harmonized Tariff System classification of the good to the 6-digit level. 7: The origin criteria under which the good qualifies. 8: The blanket period (if the certification covers multiple shipments). 9: Authorized signature and date. Mexico requires a certificate of origin to demonstrate that U.S. goods qualify for the preferential tariff treatment under USMCA. For additional information, reference Chapter 5 Origin Procedures, Article 5.2, and Annex 5-A here.

## Meat and Poultry Export Certificate of Wholesomeness - Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS Form 9060-5)

Mexico requires the issuance of the Meat and Poultry Export Certificate of Wholesomeness, FSIS Form 9060-5, by inspection personnel from FSIS' Office of Field Operations. The document certifies that meat and meat products are from animals that received both antemortem and postmortem inspection and found wholesome. The certificate, issued to the exporter, includes the consignee's thorough information. Additionally, it must contain the district office, country of destination, folio number, plant number and city, type of facility, net weight, quantities by type of packaging, and number of containers in the shipment. In the "remarks" section, the inspector must specify the slaughter date, packing date, and lot number. Additionally, it must include the product's composition (for example: hot dogs containing beef, pork, and turkey). Depending on the product, Mexican authorities might require additional sanitary statements in the remarks section, as well.

The specific sanitary remarks or "attestations" are found in <u>FSIS Export Library- Requirements by Country</u>. The Spanish language requirements are found on SENASICA's website under the *Modulo de Consulta de Zoosanitarios para la Importacion* (<u>MCRZI</u>). The reader should periodically check these sites. These are living documents regularly modified when the sanitary status of the commodities changes, or agreements between APHIS and SENASICA do away with some of the attestations.

Animal Casings Export Certificate - Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS Form 9060-7)
FSIS' animal casings health certificate is similar to the meat certificate, verifying that casings come from animals inspected antemortem and postmortem and found fit for human consumption. In addition to this form, a Letterhead Certificate for Pork Casings must accompany shipments (see Documentation Requirements section D. Pork Products numeral 8), attesting that the United States is free of classical swine fever (hog cholera).

# Egg Products Export Certificate of Wholesomeness - Food Safety and Inspection Service (FSIS Form 9060-5EP)

The Egg Products Export Certificate FSIS Form 9060-5EP falls under FSIS' Field Operations Staff. The document certifies that an accredited veterinarian inspected the egg products and found them fit for human consumption. The document is issued to the exporter and includes the consignee's information. Other data includes district office, country of destination, folio number, plant number and city, type of facility, net weight, quantities by type of packaging, and number of containers making up the lot. As required by the Mexican Zoosanitary Health Requirements sheet (known as HRZ in Spanish), additional certification statements are found in FSIS Export Library – Requirements for Exporting Processed Egg Products.

## Export Certificate for Animal Products (Human Consumption and Animal Feed/Food) (APHIS VS Form 16-4 and Form 16-4A)

APHIS' veterinarians' issue sanitary certificates for animal products for human consumption, animal feed, and certain industrial products containing animal components. To meet Mexico's requirements, the certificates' validity must be issued by accredited veterinarians on <u>VS Form 16-4</u> and, if necessary, <u>VS Form 16-4A</u>, and include required attestations, if applicable. #### **For Human Consumption**

- Complements, supplements, additives, and flavorings (bovine and porcine gelatin and blood ingredients).
- Food preparations with less than 2 percent meat ingredients.
- Gelatin and collagen: Hydrolyzed bovine bone-derived gelatins.
- Gelatin and collagen: Hydrolyzed proteins (bovine skin-derived gelatin and collagen).
- Milk and dairy: Milk or Dairy Products (Bovine, Caprine or Ovine Origin).

\*Note: Certificates for these products that require amendments or reissuance must be resent to the local APHIS office that initially issued the document.

#### For Feed, Industrial Use, Hides, and Skins

- Animal fats for animal feed or industrial uses.
- Animal feed and food: Feed rations (not including pet food).
- Animal feed and food: Rations containing porcine and poultry ingredients and intended for aquatic species.
- Animal feed and food: Pet foods for dogs and cats.
- Animal feed and food: Pet treats and similar products not containing animal product ingredients.
- Animal origin hormones for animal use or manufacturing.
- Blood and blood products for diagnostics and research, including fetal bovine serum.
- Bovine and porcine blood products for animal feeding.
- Complements, supplements, additives, and flavorings (bovine and porcine gelatin and blood ingredients) for human consumption.
- Feathers
- Feed additives with aquatic animal ingredients.
- Additives, complements and supplements for aquatic species use.
- Dairy products for animal feed.
- Porcine pancreatin.
- Processed egg products for animal feed.
- Porcine or poultry meals also containing fish meals.
- Swine offal (meat, offal, viscera, and pastes) for pet food manufacturing
- Trophy materials (unfinished).
- Cervid hides and skins for manufacturing.
- Limed bovine hides and skins for manufacturing or animal feed.
- Salted bison/bovine hides and skins for manufacturing purposes.
- Salted ostrich hides and skins for manufacturing purposes.
- Salted porcine hides and skins for manufacturing purposes.
- Salted rawhide for manufacturing purposes.
- Salted sheep and goat pelts and skins.
- Pig bristles and Porcine hydrolyzed protein for animal use.
- Rendered bovine, porcine, poultry meals.
- Mechanically separated poultry for animal use.

Shell Egg Grading Certificate (AMS Form LP-210S) and Disease Free Certification Statements

Fresh table eggs and pasteurized in-shell eggs exported to Mexico must be processed and packed under USDA's voluntary grading service and demonstrate compliance with the avian influenza (AI) monitoring program. The certificates accompanying the consignment must include an AMS Form LP-210S Shell Egg Grading Certificate (previously Form PY210S) and <u>Disease Free Certification Statements</u>. These certificates are issued and signed by an AMS licensed grader. For information on the required attestations, visit AMS's website: <u>Mexico Guidance Documents</u>.

#### **Egg Food Products Sanitation Certificate**

Mexico requires a zoosanitary certificate for food products containing eggs or egg ingredients. For egg products and egg food preparations produced by a facility approved by AMS' Audit Services Branch, a certified AMS official must issue the export certification on Form LP234 "Processed Egg and Egg Products Export Certificate" will be put into service effective January 1, 2022. The certificate covers points 26-31 in Mexico's HRZ for Food Preparations for Human Consumption

The certificate covers points 26-31 in Mexico's HRZ for Food Preparations for Human Consumption (098-13-241-USA-USA).

For egg food products produced by a facility not inspected by FSIS or audited by AMS, the exporter should seek guidance from AMS, which usually requires the facility to apply for audit services. #### **Hatching Eggs Protocol and Health Certificate (APHIS VS Form 17-6)**

For importing hatching eggs into Mexico, SENASICA requires that APHIS issue a health certificate (<u>VS Form 17-6</u>) attesting to the eggs' health and origin, including sampling and testing procedures specified in the voluntary National Poultry Improvement Plan (NPIP). #### Health Certificates for Live Animals and Germplasm – APHIS Health Certificate

Mexican import regulations for live animals and germplasm require a health certificate issued by APHIS. These must be completed and signed by an accredited veterinarian, verifying the animals' health status through visual inspections, required testing, and included in the shipment's documentation. Mexico accepts electronically signed health certificates for cattle and horses shipped to Mexico through the Veterinary Export Health Certification System (VEHCS). The accredited veterinarian digitally signs the certificates and provides copies to the shippers, as these must complement the shipment. Issuing certificates through VECHS speeds the export process, eases record-keeping, tracks the load, and provides real-time data analysis.

# Health Certificate and of Origin for Seafood – National Oceanic Atmospheric Administration (NOAA)

Mexico's import regulations for seafood products require an export certificate attesting to the product's wholesomeness and origin. The certificate issued by the U.S. Department of Commerce's NOAA. Under NOAA Seafood Inspection Program, the certificates meet country-specific requirements, including a Commodity Specific Certificate of Origin in Mexico's case. Mexican law categorizes and mandates that different regulators carry out inspection. SADER regulates the import of crustaceans such as lobsters, crabs, crayfish, and shrimps. Other seafood products, including processed products, must comply with import regulations established by the Federal Commission for the Protection against Sanitary Risks (COFEPRIS), requiring obtaining an import permit. #### Phytosanitary Certificate-Plant Protection and Quarantine – APHIS

Mexican import regulations for plants, seeds for planting, and unprocessed plant products require a phytosanitary certificate issued by APHIS' Plant Protection and Quarantine (PPQ) office. The document certifies that plants and plant products, such as propagation material, seeds for planting, wood, and processed wood products, underwent inspection or tested according to required procedures, free from quarantine pests, and conform to Mexico's phytosanitary requirements. #### Certificate of Free Sale / Certificate of Health or Sanitation for Processed Products

COFEPRIS regulations stipulate that a certificate of health or sanitation must accompany imports of processed products, but, depending on the product, the importer must either request an import permit or submit an import notification. The U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA) issues different types of <a href="export certificates">export certificates</a> that will satisfy COFEPRIS requirements including a Certificate to a Foreign Government and the Certificate of Free Sale. Other federal government agencies and state agencies may also issue certificates accepted by COFEPRIS

The certificate's purpose assures the importing authorities that the product complies with U.S. requirements and sold freely in the US. To understand products requiring the certification, exporters

should compare the products' Harmonized Tariff System by accessing the COFEPRIS <u>website</u>. If exporting dietary supplements, it is the company's responsibility to make sure its products are safe and that any claims are valid; COFEPRIS labeling regulations can be found in <u>Articles 173-174</u> of SALUD's "Regulation of Sanitary Control of Products and Services."

#### **Section III. Specific Attestations Required on Export Certificate(s)**

Specific attestations required to export U.S. food and agricultural products to Mexico are available by visiting USDA APHIS, AMS, and FSIS websites, as highlighted above, as well as the Mexican regulators.

For applicable export requirements for meat and poultry products under FSIS, visit the FSIS Export Requirements for Mexico website.

Note: Negotiations between FSIS, APHIS, and SENASICA on implementing electronic certification are in progress.

#### **Section IV. Government Certificates Entry Requirements**

#### **Meat and Poultry Export Certificate of Wholesomeness**

The document must be signed by an accredited FSIS Meat and Poultry Inspection Program. Mexico requires the shipment to include the original form and allows multiple lots if the loads enter simultaneously at the port of entry.

## **Animal Casings Export Certificate for Countries Requiring Ante-mortem, Post-mortem, and Fit for Human Food Statements**

The document must be signed by an accredited FSIS Meat and Poultry Inspection Program inspector. The original certificate must accompany each shipment.

#### **FSIS Egg Product Export Certificate of Wholesomeness**

The document must be signed by an accredited FSIS Meat and Poultry Inspection Program inspector, including the inspector's printed name and date. An original of the document must accompany each shipment.

# AMS Shell Egg Grading Certificate and Disease-Free Statements for Table Eggs; AMS Processed Egg, and Egg Products Export Certificate

The documents are not valid unless signed by a certified AMS official, including the inspector's printed name and date. An original of the documents must accompany each shipment.

#### Phytosanitary Certificate-Plant Protection and Quarantine-PPQ

An original of this document by Mexican Customs can be valid for multiple lots if shipments enter simultaneously through the same port of entry.

#### **APHIS Health Certificate for Animal Products**

The document requires the signature of an APHIS Veterinary Services official. An original of the document must accompany each shipment.

#### **APHIS Certificate for Poultry or Hatching Eggs for Export**

The original certificate must accompany the shipment upon arrival at the port-of-entry inspection point.

#### **International Health Certificate for Live Animals**

The document's original is required and must be completed and signed by a APHIS Veterinary DVM. This certificate is valid for multiple lots if the shipments arrive simultaneously for inspection at the corresponding livestock export pen on the U.S. side of the border. Mexico allows USDA Accredited Veterinarians (AVs) to complete animal health certificates using the VEHCS. SENASICA also accepts the electronic signature of the AVs.

\*Note: To avoid problems at the port of entry, the relevant stakeholder verifies that the certifying official signs FSIS, AMS, APHIS export certificates, and the corresponding letterheads.

#### **Certificate of Free Sale**

On July 25, 2007, Mexico's Secretariat of Agriculture posted revised requirements in the Federal Animal Health Law for certificates of free sale for specific animal feeds, including pet food. Currently, exporters must present an original certificate of free sale upon entry of the product, issued by U.S. state health offices. For some products, SADER will accept an affidavit from the manufacturer indicating its free sale in the United States. Avoid submitting supplier or manufacturer export declarations; shipments will suffer rejection.
