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Report Highlights:

This report identifies the export certification requirements for agricultural and food products. The Venezuelan ministries routinely issue import permits, import licenses, and register processed food products. This annual report reflects minor changes from the 2024 edition.

The USDA is unable to officially verify information provided with the host country due to the 2019 suspension of U.S. embassy operations in Caracas. Exporters are strongly advised to work closely with Venezuelan importers to confirm the information contained here.

Note for Exporters: The U.S. Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) administers economic sanctions related to Venezuela. Exporters should review the [OFAC U.S. Department of the Treasury](#) website for further details. These sanctions exempt transactions related to the export of agricultural and food products and do not prevent the issuance of export certificates by the USDA.

Executive Summary

This report is for U.S. exporters and details the documentation required for products entering Venezuela. According to current animal and plant health and food safety standards and regulations, Venezuela requires import certificates and related documents depending on the imported products. Documents include sanitary and/or phytosanitary health certificates and food health certificates from the country of origin (Certificate of Free Sale in the case of the United States). The Venezuelan importer is responsible for submitting these documents to the appropriate customs and government authorities when a shipment arrives at the port of entry. Failure to present the required documents will delay or potentially result in the rejection of the shipment for entry into Venezuela. There have been no changes to Venezuelan export certification regulations in the past year.

Food and agricultural product imports are subject to a list of requirements provided in the Venezuelan Harmonized Tariff Schedule (Spanish: *Arancel de Aduanas*) by a product's tariff schedule (Spanish: *regimen legal*). These requirements include sanitary import permits, import licenses, and product registration certification.

There are multiple authorities responsible for issuing required import documents. The National Institute of Integral Agriculture and Animal Health (Spanish acronym: INSAI), under the Ministry of Agriculture and Lands (Spanish acronym: MAT), is the sanitary and phytosanitary (SPS) agency that issues animal and plant health import permits. The Ministry of Food (MINPAL) issues import licenses based on the need for imports. The Ministry of Health (MINSALUD) issues food registration certification for all domestic and imported processed food products. Food products that are not registered in their country of origin cannot be registered in Venezuela. In addition to import permits and licenses, Venezuelan importers must submit a report contesting the need for specific products, for which the Maduro authorities will provide a certificate of non-production.

Animal Products and Unprocessed Plant Products

The National Institute of Integral Agriculture and Animal Health is the primary animal and plant health regulatory agency. It is responsible for quality control and inspection of everything related to the manufacture, processing, importation, exportation, storage, distribution, and marketing of food, biological products, medications, and animal feed. In addition, it oversees the laboratories that conduct quality control of foods and food products. The INSAI is the regulatory equivalent of the U.S. Department of Agriculture’s Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) and the Food Safety Inspection Service (FSIS), as well as the U.S. Food and Drug Administration (FDA).

The INSAI oversees the issuance of SPS import permits for products and sub-products of plant or animal origin, as well as animals and plant breeding materials. The following guidelines are provided by INSAI:

- Prior to importing animal products and/or unprocessed plant products, importers should request and obtain a sanitary health import permit from INSAI.
- Required SPS statements (treatment and other conditions) for each product type are decided by INSAI on a case-by-case basis.
- Required SPS statements are written on the import permit issued by INSAI.
- The “remarks” section of the export documentation on the APHIS or FSIS letterhead certificate should include the required SPS statements requested in the import permit. It should be written in both English and Spanish.
- An APHIS veterinarian or equivalent FSIS official must sign the export certificate.
- No product should be loaded on a vessel before the import permit is received and the sanitary statements required are written and verified on the USDA export certificate.
- INSAI’s import permits have a non-renewable validity period of between 60 and 90 days, depending on the product.
- Sanitary import permits are issued for animal products and livestock-farming inputs (valid for 60 days).
- Phytosanitary import permits are issued for plant products (valid for 90 days).
- Import permits are only valid for one shipment.
- Every shipment must be accompanied by an import permit and its corresponding APHIS or FSIS export certificate.

Processed Animal Products

All FSIS-inspected meat and poultry plants are eligible to export to Venezuela. An FSIS certificate must accompany each shipment of meat and poultry and/or products. Venezuelan importers are required to have an import permit before importing meat and poultry products. The following certificate requirements are currently included in the FSIS export library:

Eligible/Ineligible Products

A. Eligible:

- Pork
- Poultry meat and poultry meat products
- Natural pork casings

B. Ineligible:

- Ruminant meat and ruminant meat products

Processing Plants Eligible to Export:

All U.S. government-inspected meat and poultry processing plants are eligible to export to Venezuela.

Processed Food Products

All domestic and imported processed food products must be registered with MINSALUD before being commercialized in Venezuela. Except for special cases, all new-to-market foreign food products must be submitted for registration before being imported.¹ MINSALUD, through its Sanitary Health Service (Servicio Autónomo de Contraloría Sanitaria) and the Directorate for Food Safety and Inspection (Dirección de Inocuidad e Inspección de Alimentos y Bebidas Alcohólicas), enforces food safety standards and regulations.

Processed food product registrations are valid for five years. Following this time, a new application must be made to MINSALUD to renew registration. Although Venezuelan law does not prohibit foreign exporters from registering food products, a local consultant or agent may be helpful in completing the food registration process. No exporter documents are required to prove or certify that a product is registered with MINSALUD.

Certificate of Free Sale for Processed or Semi-Processed Food Products

Venezuela requires a “sanitary/health export certificate” to register processed or semi-processed food products issued by competent authorities in the country of origin. The certificate must state that the food is for human consumption, processing, or used as an input in food for human consumption in the country of origin, with a 12-month validity period from the date of application.

The Venezuelan Harmonized Tariff Schedule refers to a “Sanitary Export Certificate” (Permiso Sanitario de Exportación) rather than a Certificate of Free Sale.² Venezuela does not accept sanitary/health export certificates issued by local or state authorities. The product must be accompanied by documentation supported by FDA or USDA, depending on the product. The Certificate of Free Sale issued by competent authorities in the country of origin must be authenticated or stamped by a public notary in accordance with the Hague Convention on Foreign Public Documents.

Should the Certificate of Free Sale not satisfy the certification requirements of the Venezuelan National Integrated Tax Administration Service (SENIAT), customs officials may ask for additional information or product testing. After a technical evaluation is carried out, the Venezuelan authorities will decide whether to accept the Certificate of Free Sale.

Sometimes, customs officials may not accept certain semi-processed and processed food products that are normally exempt from sanitary certificates issued by third countries. In such cases, it is necessary to obtain an explanatory letter from a competent authority stating that the product was processed or manufactured to the extent that there is negligible risk of harboring quarantine plant pests or some sanitary public health concern. Necessary Documents for Registering Imported Food Products in Venezuela

The following procedures and requirements are the responsibility of the importer. However, to best comply with product registration requirements, the exporter may have to provide additional documents and certifications from the manufacturer.

1. “Sistema Automatizado Para Registro De Productos: Alimentos y Bebidas” (SIACS). See link: <https://190.205.57.252/siacsv2/> with the duty stamp attached.
2. Certificate of Free Sale, issued by the competent authorities of the country of origin, authenticated or sealed by a public notary in the country of origin.
3. Physical-chemical and microbiological analyses of the product made in Venezuela, as specified by the Venezuelan Commission of Industrial Norms (CONVENIN).

Select food products (Table 2) must be sent for laboratory testing at the MINSALUD Rafael Rangel National Hygiene Institute (Instituto Nacional de Higiene Rafael Rangel):

Note: Products not included in this list can be tested at private laboratories officially sanctioned by the National Autonomous Standardization, Quality, Metrology and Technical Regulations Service (SENCAMER).

4. Notarized Power of Attorney, from the manufacturer to the importer.
5. Authorization from the importer to the representative or advisor to conduct the Sanitary Registration (Notarized Power of Attorney).
6. One original label of the product as it is typically sold in the country of origin.
7. For the representative sample, only images will be submitted in all views: side, front, and rear.

To register a product, all documents issued overseas must be authenticated by the Venezuelan Consular officials accredited in the country of origin. These documents are valid for one year, counted from the date of issuance. If written in a language other than Spanish, it must be translated into Spanish by a certified interpreter.

Wood Packing Material

All wood packaging materials arriving in Venezuela must carry the appropriate international seals certifying that the wood has been treated as recommended by the International Plant Protection Convention's Guidelines for Regulating Wood Packaging Material in International Trade, effective August 1, 2005.

Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)

Country of Origin/Free Sale Certificate

MINSALUD requires a health certificate from the country of origin (Certificado Sanitario del País de Origen) to ensure that the food or beverage product imported into Venezuela is commercialized in the country of origin.³

Phytosanitary Health Certificate

The MAT requires a Phytosanitary Certificate (Certificado Fitosanitario) to ensure that import requirements mitigate the risks of plant pests and diseases entering Venezuela. Certificates must be issued by a relevant competent authority of the exporting country.

Sanitary Certificate

INSAI requires a Sanitary Certificate (Permiso Sanitario de Importación) to prevent the importation of animals, or their by-products, with sanitary problems, to protect domestic animal health, and ensure food safety. The sanitary certificate, provided by the competent sanitary authority of the exporting country, must comply with Venezuelan import requirements.

Section II. Specific Attestations Required on Export Certificate(s)

Specific SPS statements (i.e., treatment and other conditions) are required for each type of product and are determined by INSAI's authorities on a case-by-case basis. Such SPS statements are provided by INSAI authorities when an importer applies for the import permit.

Section III. Venezuelan Export Certificate Legal Entry Requirements

- Original SPS certificates from the country of origin must accompany the product at the time of entry.
- SPS certificates from the country of origin are only accepted for one shipment and one specified port of entry.
- Venezuela does not accept "Suppliers or Manufacturers Export Declaration" as proof of compliance.
- For processed food products, no specific certificate from the exporting country is required at the time of entering Venezuelan ports if the product has already been registered with MINSALUD.
- Venezuela does not accept sanitary export certificates from U.S. state or local authorities.

Import Licenses for Basic Agricultural Products

Under its World Trade Organization (WTO) commitments, Venezuela is entitled to administer tariff rate quotas for up to 62 H.S. code headings. The tariff rate quotas are administered through an import license regime. MINAL is responsible for issuing import licenses, but approval is subject to the concurrence of an inter-ministerial commission, which consists of the following ministries: Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Commerce (MINCOMERCIO), MAT, MINPAL, and MINSALUD.

Guidelines and requirements for applying for import licenses were published in the Official Gazette No. 38,452 (2006), although authorities have made more recent changes.

The import license for certain essential food products, as defined by Venezuelan authorities, is valid for periods ranging from six months to one year. (Table 3). Products that benefit from an extended import license including dairy products (milk, cream, cheese), sorghum, soybean oil, palm oil, and coconut oil. Import licenses are valid for three to four months for non-essential products. Other relevant guidelines including the following:

- Import licenses typically have validity periods of four, six, or twelve-months, and can only be renewed if, after expiration, they have not been used for reasons outside the importer's control.
- When applying for a license, local importers are required to submit a monthly list of realized imports, sharing information on volumes and values, together with the invoice of the most recent import and the volume and value of the related merchandise.
- The importer must indicate the amount of the allocated quota that remains unused.
- Local importers are required to obtain a certificate that the import in question is not domestically produced (Certificado de NO-Producción) and/or a certificate indicating

that the import is a product that is not sufficiently produced domestically (Certificado de Insuficiencia) from MINCOMERCIO, prior to obtaining import licenses.
