Report Highlights:

This report lists the major export certificates and other documentation required by the Government of New Zealand for U.S. exporters of food and agricultural products. New Zealand's import requirements for food and agricultural products are complex and change frequently. Therefore, this report focuses on the certificate requirements for U.S. products with the strongest export potential.

Executive Summary

The Ministry for Primary Industries (MPI) is the key organization that regulates food imported into New Zealand. MPI has the lead role in biosecurity protection (e.g., preventing unwanted pests and diseases from being imported into New Zealand and controlling, managing, or eradicating pests should they arrive). It also protects the nation's agricultural industry by maintaining public health and safety, and ensuring the integrity of imported foods. The Food Standards Australia New Zealand (FSANZ) is responsible for setting food standards that govern the content and labeling of foods sold in New Zealand and Australia.

This report contains certificate information on the key U.S. products supplied to New Zealand, including products such as citrus, pork, and stone fruit. Total imports of U.S. agricultural products into New Zealand reached a record US\$ 570 million in 2024, and the growth of shipments of U.S. products to New Zealand has continued to be strong.

Section III: Government Certificate Legal Entry Requirements

To import food from the United States to New Zealand, a Certificate of Analysis from the USDA or State Department of Agriculture is required. Typically, the certificate is issued by the Animal and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS), and states that the food meets New Zealand's import standards and is safe for consumption. Most certificates are valid for one shipment only. Certificates issued for other countries are not accepted.

New Zealand does not require a certificate attesting irradiated foods, rules for irradiation of foods can be found on the FSANZ site here.

Entry requirements are set out in the Ministry for Primary Industries' <u>Import Health Standards</u>. Original documents relating to the shipment must accompany each shipment.

Section IV: Other Certification Requirements for Market Entry

U.S. exporters are required to meet both biosecurity and food safety requirements. For more information on New Zealand's food safety requirements, see the Ministry for Primary Industries <u>website</u>.

The Organic Products and Production Bill was passed in the New Zealand Parliament in 2023, which set important standards for organic classification. The work program to structure the new regulatory regime is currently being worked on by MPI, with no indicated release date.
