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Report Highlights:

France as a member of the European Community has implemented EU regulations for the import of animal and plant products. The US export certification requirements for most products destined for the EU have been harmonized, but a few products not yet harmonized are subject to French national regulations.

France as part of the European Community has implemented EU regulations for the import of products of animal and plant origin and therefore export certification requirements for most products destined for the EU market have been harmonized. <u>Regulation (EU) 2019/625</u> defines composite products as foodstuffs intended for human consumption that contain processed products of animal origin and ingredients of plant origin. Composite products include a wide variety of products, including cheesecakes, high protein food supplements, pizza, and lasagnas. U.S. exports of "composite products" continue to be restricted due to burdensome certification requirements. While the U.S. is eligible to ship hormone-free meat, dairy products, egg products, and fishery products separately, it is often not possible to ship the composite products that combine these eligible ingredients.

Exporters should be aware that in parallel with the aforementioned changes to the composite product certificate that was triggered by an update of the EU's Animal Health Law, the EU also made changes to the categories of composite products that require U.S. Government-issued health certificates. The new system is no longer based on the percentage of ingredients of animal product in the final product and goes into effect on January 15, 2022. It establishes three categories of composite products: (1) non-shelf stable composite products, (2) shelf stable composite products. All processed products of animal origin have to be sourced from EU-approved establishments. The EU continues to require composite product certificates for all non-shelf stable products and for shelf stable composite products with a meat ingredient.

For shelf stable products not containing meat, no certificates signed by the U.S. Government are required. For these products, the representative of the importer must declare that the goods meet the relevant EU requirements, using the "Private Attestation" model form

A few products not yet harmonized are subject to French national regulations. Check <u>with France 2021</u> <u>FAIRS report</u> for more details. The competent French authority needs to be consulted on a case-by-case basis to address requirements for non-harmonized products. Imported products must meet existing Member State requirements and products must be accompanied by the proper certification at port of arrival. In general, health certificates are required for all imported products of animal origin and phytosanitary certificates are needed for all plant products that could introduce pests into the EU. In France, food safety is the primary responsibility of Ministry of Agriculture and Food.

Export certificates must be in the official language of France, therefore in French.

Usually the importer (or possibly an exporter or a freight forwarder) applies to the authority with all relevant details. There is no set form for this kind of application. EU food legislation is translated into the 24 official languages in use in the EU-28 (including French) and is published in the Official Journal. The Eurlex website http://eur-lex.europa.eu/en/index.htm provides free access to European Union laws. EU plant and plant product import regulations have been harmonized and are published in a single directive. Unlike veterinary products, there is only one model certificate for all plant products in accordance with international regulations laid out by the International Plant Protection Convention of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations. www.ippc.int/
