Food and Agricultural Import Regulations and Standards -Certification

FAIRS Export Certificate Report

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Report Highlights:

This report focuses on Bulgarian certification requirements when they may differ or are in addition to EU-harmonized certification. This report should be read in conjunction with the <u>EU FAIRS Export</u> <u>Certificate report</u> prepared by the FAS Office in the U.S. Mission to the European Commission (USEU).

Disclaimer: This report was prepared by the Office of Agricultural Affairs of the USDA/Foreign Agricultural Service in Sofia, Bulgaria for U.S. exporters of domestic food and agricultural products. While every possible care was taken in the preparation of this report, information provided may not be completely accurate either because policies have changed since its preparation, or because clear and consistent information about these policies was not available. It is highly recommended that U.S. exporters verify the full set of import requirements with their foreign customers, who are normally best equipped to confirm requirements with local authorities, before any goods are shipped.

Section I. List of All Export Certificates Required By Government (Matrix):

Being an EU member since 2007, Bulgaria applies EU harmonized regulations on export certificates for plant or animal products whether or not they are intended for human consumption. However, in the absence of an EU-harmonized certificate, Bulgaria may require certain specific health certificates and occasionally the lack of specific details in the governing regulation also provides significant leeway for border inspectors to interpret.

Competent authority on certificates the Bulgarian Food Safety Agency (BFSA) under the Ministry of Agriculture and Foods. The Agency is responsible both for agricultural products for human consumption as well as for those for non-human consumption.

Agricultural products are examined when they enter Bulgaria by the Bulgaria Border Inspection Posts. There are 8 border inspections points in Bulgaria. TRACES software system is not applied yet but the BFSA plans are to introduce the system in the first quarter of 2014.

Bulgaria has derogation for updating all BIPs to execute both veterinary and phyto-sanitary control until August 2014. Currently, four BIPs have this ability and the other 4 should be upgraded in the first half of 2014.

The above listed Veterinary Certificates require the signature of an Official Veterinarian.

Section III. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s):

According to official statements of BFSA, Bulgaria does not apply any exception or any specific requirements for imports of food and agricultural products into Bulgaria and thus no products are subject to special certification other than that of the European Union. European Union legislation calls for many health and supervisory requirements that are meant to guarantee that imports meet the standards of production in Member States.

Bulgaria, as an EU Member State, follows all rules and regulations that govern food legislation, including certification, within the European Union. While certification requirements are developed at the EU level, Bulgarian authorities are responsible for the enforcement of the regulations.

It is important to note that when EU-wide legislation is incomplete, not harmonized or absent, Bulgaria might require certain specific health certificates although to date no such specific certificates have been identified. Additionally, sometimes applicable regulations provide significant leeway for border inspectors to interpret.

Certification requirements are developed at the EU level. However, Member State inspection services are responsible for enforcement. Bulgaria is among the most vigilant of EU Member States with respect to enforcement of the import requirements. There is little if any tolerance policy assumed for mistakes that affect the identity and traceability of the shipment (e.g. wrong establishment number).

According to General Principles for Certification, the certificate must be issued before the consignment to which it relates leaves the control of the competent authority of the country of dispatch.

Special Import Permits

Samples without Commercial value to Bulgaria

For sanitary reasons, food products imported into the EU, even if they are not intended for commercial

sale, must meet certain requirements on food hygiene and animal health.

The same rules to commercial shipments apply to samples without commercial value regarding the Common Entry Document (CED published as <u>Annex II to Regulation 669/2009</u>).

Responsible Authorities for Health and Veterinary Certificates

Bulgaria has a centralized system for controlling the feed and food chain. The central government has total oversight over the control carried out in customs, imports, and on monitoring and sampling plans throughout the food and feed chain.

The Ministry of Agriculture and Foods controls agricultural product imports intended for human consumption, through Bulgarian Food Safety Agency (BFSA). It also controls imports of animal feed/ingredients and live animals not intended for direct human consumption.

The BFSA is relatively young institution. It was established in early 2011 through a major reform by uniting 3 executive agencies – Plant Protection and Phyto-Sanitary Agency and Veterinary Medical Service, both under the control of the Ministry of Agriculture, and Food Hygiene Agency, part of the Ministry of Health.

The BFSA is the competent authority on official control on all food imports, exports and manufacturing with the exception of bottled water (mineral, spring, and table water) (Art.28/Food Law)

Section V. Other Certification/Accreditation Requirements:

The use of special required certification may also affect the control regime upon import. For instance, Almonds must be accompanied by a Voluntary Aflatoxin Sampling Program – VASP certificate issued by laboratories approved for the VASP program. The presence of such certificate determines the percentage of shipments tested upon entry in the EU.
