Section IV: Government Certificate Legal Entry Requirements

All original certificates are required to be issued prior to export and to accompany the corresponding products at the port of entry. Taiwan authorities generally only accept certificates issued by the exporting country's competent government authority. Private industry issued certificates are not accepted. Any modification on either an affidavit or a certificate must be signed by an endorsing official. Without official signature/initials, a new affidavit or certificate shall be reissued to replace the original one.

Section V: Other Certification/Accreditation Requirements

Apart from export certificates, products imported into Taiwan must also meet a number of other requirements. Details of these requirements are contained in the FAIRS narrative report updated each year by this office. The most recent update is dated December 2017.
