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# **Report Name:** Food and Agricultural Import Regulations and Standards **Export Certificate Report**

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### **Report Highlights:**

Romania applies European Union (EU) regulations on imports of animal and non-animal products from the United States. The legislation on export certification is generally harmonized at the EU level. Romanian legislation applies to the minor categories on which requirements are not harmonized. This report should be read in conjunction with the EU FAIRS Export Certificate Report, as it provides comprehensive information about export certificates.

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## **General Information**

Romania harmonized its national sanitary-veterinary requirements and export certificates with the legislation developed at EU level. As a member of the EU, Romania requires that U.S. certifying agents use these EU standard formats. Export certificates must be in English or the Romanian language. The certificates must be issued before the consignment leaves the control of the competent authority of the United States.

Romanian authorities are responsible for enforcing EU legislation through inspection of imported goods and the accompanying certificates. The competence on health certificates for live animals and animal and non-animal origin food products is the <u>National Sanitary Veterinary and Food Safety Authority</u> (ANSVSA), while the competence on phytosanitary certificates is the <u>Ministry of Agriculture and Rural Development</u> (MARD).

# Section I. List All the Export Certificates Required by Government

The EU maintains various model certificates that are used in all EU Member States. <u>EU Commission</u> <u>Implementing Regulation (EU) 2019/628</u> provides model official certificates for certain animals and goods. Romania does not maintain a database with the model certificates for importing goods into Romania. Therefore, prior to shipment, exporters should always confirm with their importers that the consignment will be allowed to enter with the documentation accompanying the consignment. If there is any doubt about which documents are required, or if any requirements are not listed, U.S. exporters should ask their importer to email the appropriate Romanian officials at <u>office@ansvsa.ro</u> with a full product description, including any animal-origin contents, and the intended use in Romania. Romanian officials will respond to the importer in writing. U.S. exporters should then obtain that response from their importer and provide it, along with a full translation (including the original email question) to their local Veterinary Services service center. Alternatively, U.S. exporters may contact directly <u>ANSVSA</u> at <u>office@ansvsa.ro</u> to inquire about the certificate model and import requirements.

# **Section II. Purpose of Specific Export Certificate(s)**

In general, Romania requires health certificates for all imported products of animal origin and phytosanitary certificates for all imported plant products. In addition to the information listed below, please check the <u>EU FAIRS Export Certificate Report</u> for specific information about EU certificates.

Import requirements for animal products into Romania are provided by <u>FSIS</u> under the <u>EU requirements</u> <u>section</u>, which includes the export certificate models. Romanian-language export certificates exist for selected commodities, such as pork and meat products. The import requirements for live animals (including embryos) and products such as collagen into Romania are available on the <u>APHIS</u> website. More specifically, they are located in the section presenting the EU requirements for <u>materials for</u> <u>human consumption</u> and <u>materials not for human consumption</u>. If a bilingual (English/Romanian) certificate for a particular species or commodity does not exist, please refer to the English version.

Import requirements for plants and plant products are harmonized at the EU level. The international body regulating the international trade with plant and plants products who lays down the models of certificates is the International Plant Protection Convention of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (IPPC). Unlike veterinary products, there is only one model certificate for all plant products in accordance with IPPC's conventions. The phytosanitary certificate is provided by the <u>EU</u> <u>Council Directive 2000/29</u> transposed in Romania through Government Decision 563/2007 with subsequent amendments. Phytosanitary certificates are issued by APHIS inspectors, who can attest to specific requirements of EU legislation by making additional declarations in the relevant box.

There are only few products/by-products for which EU legislation is not harmonized. In such cases, import of these products is subject to Romanian national legislation and import requests are assessed by the competent authorities on a case-by-case basis. <u>ANSVSA</u> is the competent authority for providing the specific import conditions on non-harmonized products.
