Report Highlights:

Post forecasts Burmese rice exports lower in May due to slow business activities along with changing trade and exchange rate policies and high domestic prices. Domestic prices for Emata increased in May due to high transportation costs and a smaller domestic supply as exporters fulfilled advanced sale contracts. Domestic prices for Shwe Bo Pawsan remained unchanged. Post corrected May's Rice Trade – Monthly report (BM2022-0009) published on May 20, 2022, by revising the total export value for the month of February 2022 in last column of Table 3.

Burmese Rice Production

The Burmese Department of Agriculture (DOA) reported in February that farmers cultivated roughly 0.98 million hectares for the MY 2021/22 second rice crop. Rice farmers have harvested about 70 percent of the second rice crop cultivated area as of May 5, 2022.

Non-Border Trade

Posts forecasts Burma's rice and broken rice exports lower in May due to changes in export and import policies (e.g., fixed exchange rates and restrictions on foreign currency deposits in bank accounts), high local prices, and a decline in domestic stocks. Rice exports in April were relatively high due to fulfillment of advanced sale contracts, but high local prices severely impacted the bottom line of exporters. Regular electricity blackouts continue in May, limiting rice mill operations and lowering the rice supply in the domestic market.




Figure 2: Major Non-Border Export Destinations for Burmese Broken Rice in April 2022 (MT)

Post revised the border trade export number for broken rice for December 2021 in Table 2. Post also updated the export figures for February 2022 in Table 3 based on the official export numbers from the Ministry of Commerce for non-border trade provided in Table 1. Official exports by type for March and April are not available at the time of reporting. The Myanmar Rice Federation reported that Burma exported more than 250,000 metric ton (MT) of rice and broken rice in April 2022 by 35 companies. Cameron, China, Angola, Philippines, and Poland were the largest export destinations for Burmese rice, while China, Belgium, Spain, Netherlands, and Poland were the largest export destinations for Burmese broken rice in April 2022 (Figures 1 and 2).

Border Trade

China continues to restrict rice and broken rice imports from Burma but allowed some rice and broken rice shipments that have been stuck at the border to enter China through the Muse border. Transportation costs are 40-50 percent lower as demand for Chinese trucks dropped after the melon season had ended.

Market Overview

Domestic wholesale prices for Emata 25 percent broken rice increased in May due to high transportation costs, purchasing by exporters who sold via advanced sale contracts, and declining stocks while superior quality Shwe Bo Pawsan remained unchanged.

Policy

The Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) published order 4/2022 (Appendix I.) on April 3, 2022, requiring all foreign currency entering an Authorized Dealer¹ (AD) licensed bank account to be converted to Myanmar Kyats at 1,850 MMK/USD within one working day from its arrival. In addition, the Foreign Exchange Supervisory Committee must approve the transfer of foreign currency out of Burma starting April 4, 2022. The CBM also released notification 12/2022 (Appendix II) requiring anyone, trade and non-trade transactions, receiving foreign currency in their Burmese bank accounts must convert the foreign currency to Myanmar Kyats within one working day from its arrival starting on April 4, 2022. The CBM, however, released directive 7/2022 on April 26, 2022, exempting exporters and importers trading at the border from notification 12/2022.

¹ Authorized dealer license bank means a bank with a license from the Central Bank to deal in foreign currency including dealing in foreign exchange operations.

Appendix I: Central Bank of Myanmar's Notification 12/2022 (Convenience Translation by Lincoln Legal Service, Myanmar)

Directive 4/2022

Subject: Matters concerning Notification 12/2022 dated 3rd April 2022 issued by the Central Bank of Myanmar

Reference: Notification 12/2022 dated 3rd April 2022 issued by the CBM

The CBM issued Notification 12/2022 on 3rd April 2022 and orders all Authorised Dealer banks to do the following:

- (a) Starting from 4th April 2022, all foreign currency (from trade or non-trade) coming from abroad into the accounts with Authorised Dealer banks of person residing in the country, except exempted income according to para. 3 of the Notification, shall, within one day from its arrival, be converted to MMK and transferred to a MMK account opened by the recipient.
- (b) The conversion of foreign currency to MMK shall be done at the exchange rate of USD 1 = MMK 1,850. Other currencies shall be converted according to the attachment, calculated based on an exchange rate of USD 1 = MMK 1,850. The CBM will update if there is a change in the exchange rate.
- (c) Starting from 4th April 2022, the transfer of foreign currency to a destination abroad shall only be done with the approval of the Foreign Exchange Regulatory Committee, Republic of the Union of Myanmar. Directives on these matters will be issued separately.
- (d) Foreign currency in the accounts opened with Authorised Dealer banks before 3rd April 2022 shall also be treated according to paras. (a) and (b). Further details will be announced subsequently.

Appendix II: Central Bank of Myanmar's Notification 12/2022

Republic of the Union of Myanmar Central Bank of Myanmar Notification No. 12/2022

3st Waxing of Tagu, 1383 ME 3 April 2022

- The Central Bank of Myanmar has issued this notification in exercise of the authority conferred under sub-section (b) of Section 49 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law.
- According to the provisions of Section 11, Section 12 and Section 13 of the Foreign Exchange Management Law, the foreign exchange earnings of the locals must be sent back to Myanmar to the foreign currency account opened at the Foreign Exchange Trading (AD) licensed banks and exchange for Myanmar Kyats within one working day.
- In case of exemption in carrying out in accordance with paragraph (2), it shall be issued separately.
- Transferring foreign currency abroad must be carried out through the AD licensed banks with the permission of the Foreign Exchange Supervisory Committee.
- Foreign currency in various foreign currency accounts that have entered Myanmar before the date of issuance of this notification shall also be made in accordance with paragraph (2) of this notification.
- The Central Bank of Myanmar revokes Notification No. 35/2021 issued on 3-10-2021 with this notification.
- 7. This notice shall take effect from the date of issue.
- Failure to comply with this notice will result in legal action under the Foreign Exchange Management Law.
