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Report Highlights:

Post forecasts Burmese rice exports lower in November. Despite the contracted shipment to Bangladesh, slow demand from African countries and high domestic prices will lead to lower exports in November. Domestic prices for Emata increased in November as local traders are purchasing stock in anticipation of a lower production. Prices for Shwe Bo Pawson also remained high.

Burmese Rice Production

The Burmese Department of Agriculture (DOA) reported that farmers have planted 6.042 million hectares of main crop rice in marketing year (MY) 2022/23 and have harvested about 16 percent of the planted acreage as of October 30, 2022.

Non-Border Trade

Posts forecasts Burma's non-border rice and broken rice exports lower in November (Table 2). Despite a rice shipment to Bangladesh in November, high domestic prices have kept demand from EU and African countries for rice and broken rice low.

Trade data by type and destination for the month of August was not available at the time of reporting. Post revised rice and broken rice export estimates for October based on estimates from the Ministry of Commerce and the Myanmar Rice Federation.

Border Trade

Post forecasts Burma's rice exports through border trade lower in November due to high domestic prices.

Market Overview

Local traders were actively purchasing rice supplies in the first week of November as many of them anticipate lower production from the main crop, which pushed domestic prices for all grades of rice higher. Prices for Emata 25 percent reached 43,500 MMK/108 lb, and prices for Shwe Bo Pawson remained high at 93,000 MMK/108 lb in mid-November.

Policy

The Central Bank of Myanmar (CBM) announced that foreign-owned companies can keep their revenue from exporting in the foreign currency and choose what to do with their earnings, while Burmese-owned companies must exchange 65 percent of their revenue from exporting at the CBM fixed rate within one working day. The fixed exchange rate is currently set at 2,100 Myanmar kyat/U.S. dollar, while the market exchange rate is 2,950 Myanmar kyat/U.S. dollar. Rice traders exporting at the border are worried that CBM might also implement the same measure for border trade.

The Department of Trade announced that importers must use money earned from exports to purchase imports in order to improve the current trade imbalance. The Department of Trade released the Export/Import Newsletter 10/2022 on October 31, 2022, that required all exporters trading at the border to submit payments through Authorized Dealer (AD) licensed banks in order to track the revenue from exporting.

The leading committee for the Protection and Promotion of the Rights and Interests of Farmers set the floor price for rice (rough) produced in MY 2022/23 at 630,000 Myanmar kyat per 100-baskets (\$150/metric ton) on November 11, 2022. Although the new floor price is higher than the last year's price (560,000 Myanmar kyat per 100-baskets), it is still much lower than current market prices. Current market prices of rice (rough) is 1,100,000-1,300,000 Myanmar kyat per 100-baskets (\$262-310/MT) depending on the type and quality of rice.
